## Security, Privacy and Integrity

The big three concerns for family historians who post their research results on the Web: security, privacy and integrity. Security of our own information and that of our families. Privacy when sharing information electronically. Integrity as practiced in verifying and reporting our family histories.

The starting point is our nearest and dearest—the people we have known all our lives. Usually with the best intentions, we follow the recommendation to begin by gathering the details about their immediate lives, and making personal contact with living relatives. Innocently, we exchange what we think we know with others who have varied viewpoints about our ancestors.

In the process, we collect and share potentially sensitive data. We post photos and trees to social networking sites and mailing lists. We plug our family names into search engines hoping to find more relatives, living and dead.

In recent years, online dealers have developed options to stand-alone family history software. We are encouraged to record our research on web sites where companies promise us absolute

security. The examples I will use here are Ancestry.com samples, but this commercial enterprise is not unique in the family history online world.

The latest communication I have received from Ancestry.com reads "PRIVACY STATEMENT Ancestry.com does not sell, rent or otherwise distribute the personal information you provide us to third party advertisers." However, Ancestry.com has appropriated user information in other ways. When you ask Ancestry.com to search for your ancestor, the results might contain sources such as FreeBMD. This is a volunteer project hosted by RootsWeb via Ancestry servers. So, essentially, volunteer work has been appropriated by Ancestry.com without the permission of contributors.

Before you upload documents and photos to an online management program, such as Ancestry, read the fine print. Does the site exclude your material from such appropriations? Have you considered the consequences of letting your subscription expire before you remove all your data from such a site? Does the provider retain the right to use your information after your subscription expires?

Mindfulness, respect, and good will are the best tools we can

develop to ensure that your use of electronic research possibilities is safe and honest. Read the fine print. Make sure you understand the implications of registration before you click the "I Agree" button. Do not post information about living people without their permission. And be sure you understand how that information might be used.

Most of all, be skeptical. Make sure that the information you post is accurate and supported by reliable sources. And require that standard of the sites you use.
