'Somewhere in the West'

When I started my adventure into ancestry, my hope was to see a record of my mother, born in Toronto 1916, with the common last name, Harvey. She grew up in Saskatchewan, ending life back in Toronto, where I was born. Surely, that would be a snap – but, no – even with the known statistics . . . nothing in Toronto. First lesson: not all vital statistics are available.

I posed the question to the charming ladies of our Historical Society and soon an email arrived with a website for me to research. This link to my mother's prairie town newspaper archives nearly knocked me from my chair.

In Preeceville, Saskatchewan, where Hilda Harvey resided from age 5 to 18, pictures, editorials, stories, class photographs, and sports teams showed smiling faces of many family members enjoying life as she had always portrayed it to me. She would croon the old song: "With someone like you . . . a pal good and true . . ." and we would end it in a comic harmony, our arms outspread like the width of her beloved blue-sky prairie horizon.

Again, with aid, more details emerge. William J. Harvey, born into a military family in Fort Amherst, England, set out for

Canada with his brother, Harry, for better prospects. Another brother headed to New Zealand, but I have yet to follow that trail. Although married with 3 children and 1 expected, he enlisted on December 15, 1915 at Toronto, served as a Gunner, and later with the Medical Corps. He was mustard-gassed while on stretcher-bearer duties, arriving home from the war on the *Royal George* in February 1919.

Receiving a land grant recorded in Saskatchewan Homestead Index, this encompassed a grueling train journey from Toronto with four small children (my mother being the baby), a horse and rickety wagon with provisions for the coming winter, and a scooped out home beside a hillock that was on their own meager 'land'.

Her Gentry parents, not understanding their circumstances, sent a dining room set to help them start in their new home. It lived in the snow, crowded under a lean-to with chopped firewood over it and under it, filling the shelves of the beautifully carved buffet as the young couple cracked the ice on their outside fireplace to heat water for their children's meals.

Fortune found them and thanks to Will's army experience, there before me, in the Preeceville newspaper archives, were photographs of the telephone

office/house where they raised 6 children to high school completion, in the heart of the growing town with wooden boardwalks and wagons passing.

My grandfather's mother joined them for some time, from England, and ran a bakery in a small shop next to the telephone office. There is a photograph of her, with her white cockatoo on her shoulder. She was a mid-wife, nurse, and exceptional gardener, growing the herbs she used in healing.

Job scarcity of the Depression Era brought the family back to Toronto — that's another adventure!

Additional tales linger, haunting now that I have such renewed faith in verbal history, such as: Was there really a 'mystery woman' that followed my grandfather home from the war and was, mother and child, turned away in a train station?Sigh!

Does it really matter? Perhaps not, but what we build will be accepted as history, hence the care in the details.
