Searching Family Tree Search at Ancestry or Rootsweb

When trying to locate information on a specific family tree it is helpful to have details gathered by family members, or a previous generation, to aid in your research. I was fortunate to learn of several genealogists in my family from different eras. And when contacted, their children were able to pass on information to me about what their relative had found.

There are Public member http://search.ancestry.ca/search/d_b.aspx?dbid=1030 and Private members trees http://search.ancestry.ca/search/d_b.aspx?dbid=1006 at Ancestry. However, you have to subscribe to Ancestry to search them; trees are not an option for those who use Ancestry Library Edition.

The public member trees show all details, including whether there is a document from Ancestry attached to the entry. For the private member trees it says that the name you searched is located in the private files but it gives you the option of sending that person a message for more information.

The family trees at Rootsweb are located in their database WorldConnect <http://wc.rootsweb.ancestry.com>

and are free to search. You also have the option of contacting the person for sources or additional information. Be sure to check when the tree was last updated to see if it's current.

While helping another person learn more about their family history, I was able to locate a couple of online family trees at Ancestry. While some of the information was correct, some was definitely not. I saw one family tree where a person reportedly died before their marriage date. You could tell that other people had downloaded the same family tree because they had the same information wrong.

I had previously viewed a few family trees for my Thomson and Elliot families, originally from Scotland, but this time I decided to look up some of my European-born ancestors to see what I could find. I started with my Kaufman family.

My grandmother was the eldest of five children in my Kaufman family line from Hungary. I found the births for all of the children in the Zichydorf church records I received a few years ago, but didn't find further info on two of the children. What happened to Maria, born in 1894 or the only son Mihaly, born in 1896? After a quick search online and I found the date of their deaths listed in a family tree at Ancestry. After writing down the

info I found, I was able to use my DVD of church records to verify the date of death for both children.

The original record showed Mihaly died in 1901 at age five. He was reportedly was scalded by hot water and died of his burns. I was able to verify this in the death record. His cause of death started with "egesi" which translates into burns or combustion in English.

Maria died in October 1911 at the age of 17, a few short days after her birthday. This was exactly six months after her sister Magdalena left for Canada. I was not yet able to make out the cause of death for her.

Remember to use the family trees posted online as a guide, not as a definitive source. Check out those who have sources listed and be sure to verify anything you find with original records, wherever possible.
